

He became a member of the order back in 1971 joining Carnarvon Lodge No.119. He joined White Rose in 1984 and was Secretary for 12 years. He had served both the Province and White Rose well over those years. David could not wait to respond and thanked the Order for all the help they had given him over the years. Mark Masonry really is the friendly degree and he had received many calls just to check in and say hello. He mentioned the wonderful work The Cleeves and Whitehead Trust did and the fact they had provided him with several weeks respite care at Connaught Court in York. His only complaint was that there seemed to be more women in there than men. He recalled one afternoon chasing a particular Lady around the gardens but when he actually caught up with her, he had forgotten why he had actually been chasing her!

The Worshipful Master W.Bro. Alan Griffin also spoke about David saying that he was a ubiquitous Mason, describing him as a pivotal member, a lynch pin and that he had steered them through some rough waters, but they were now in calm water again. He had very fond memories of David and would always hold David dear to his heart. A fabulous afternoon with Brethren returning to the heat and very warm cars.

Help and Compassion for Female Abuse Charity in South Africa (Western Division)



In 2019 the Widows sons Motorcycle Chapter 'Hiram' asked the Mark District Grand Lodge of South Africa Western Division Executive Council for a donation for a charity called 'Sisters Incorporated', a Gender violence sanctuary for women and children based in Cape Town. Sisters Incorporated is a private welfare organisation, founded in 1959. It was originally established as a refuge for single, pregnant women at a time when tremendous stigma was attached to being unmarried and pregnant.

The Mark Degree members are very active in the Widows sons throughout South Africa and a decision was made to support this cause donating R3,000 (£150) towards the purchase of welcome packages consisted of toiletries and underwear that are handed to the ladies and children upon arrival.

The Mark executive then sent representatives to visit the Sisters Incorporated property to identify the needs of the residents. Various items were identified namely the children's play area, the Pantry where perishables are kept and the fridge that is broken.

In 2020 the Covid Pandemic caused a lockdown that prevented any masonic activities and when the situation eased in November a Spit Braai was held that was supported by more than 70 members of all four constitutions operating in South Africa and the Widows Sons Chapter. The amount raised was R15,000 (£750) and the 80% going to the charity. Lockdown again prevented any further masonic business but in November of 2021 we held another Spit Braai and raised R20,000 (£1,000) which we then used to undertake the repairs that we identified. Altogether almost R28,000 (£1,400) was donated to our charity paying for the children's play area, air conditioning and the new fridge.



It's always the quiet ones who surprise you. Those people who 'hide their light under a bushel.'

E.Kt. Geoff James, of Temple Balsall Preceptory, is one such person. Quiet and unassuming. A great supporter, not only of K.T., but athletics too. For the latter he had the honour of carrying the Queen's Commonwealth Games Baton through Sutton Coldfield, his home town. At the end of his relay section he was congratulated by Cllr Janet Cairns, Mayor of the Royal Town of Sutton Coldfield.

A richly deserved honour. But why ?



A member of Birchfield Harriers (who meet and train at The Alexandra Stadium where the Commonwealth Games are now being held) he has served the sport of athletics for 68 years as a regional level athlete and coach. He coached Mary Stewart to a Commonwealth Games gold medal in the 1500 metres event at the 1978 Commonwealth Games.

Geoff was an endurance coach for the British Athletics team in international matches back in the late 1970's and as recently as 2015. After the turn of the millennium, he became the Midlands area coach mentor. He's worked with athletes from all backgrounds and from countries as diverse as Italy to South Africa. He's supported athletes from low-income backgrounds and coached disability athletes, most notably, John Wassell, who represented Team GB in 1969.

Geoff is a man who is truly athlete centred, who inspires other to achieve their best. For this and too many other reasons to list here, he was awarded by England Athletics the 2019 'Volunteers' Award for Services to Athletics or Running.

Supera Moras Conclave No. 49 Celebrates its Centenary in fine style



It is not very often that a centenary takes place in The Order of the Secret Monitor so it's a moment to cherish and celebrate when it does. That is exactly what took place at Rochdale Masonic Hall on Saturday, 30 July when Supera Moras (The Internet Conclave) to give its full title, held a meeting to celebrate 100 years of continuous working.



The Consecration took place at Bolton Masonic Hall on Saturday, 5 February 1921. *Supera Moras* is Latin for 'overcoming delays or difficulty' and the motto adopted by the Town of Bolton. In the early days the conclave thrived on the back of the desire for men to join freemasonry after the First World War, and the membership continued to ebb and flow but in May 2000 it was decided that the conclave would pursue a different direction.

The conclave became 'The Internet Conclave' attracting members from around the country and latterly from around the world and meeting at different venues. This has proved successful venture and the conclave thrives today with a strong and growing membership. It has formed a bond with Ribble Valley Scarlet Cord Consistory with the two units meeting on the same day allowing brethren to enjoy a full day of masonry in both orders.

So it was no surprise that this meeting was well attended with a total of 85 brethren in attendance with the Most Worthy Grand Supreme Ruler, Andrew Christopher Sweeny in attendance. He was joined by Christian Givvons the Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler and Stephen Holcroft his Deputy, who are both members of the Conclave.



Heads of many other Provinces along with their deputies made up a full complement of distinguished visitors who were processed into the lodge room under the canopy of swords provided by the East Lancashire Arch of Steel.




With the Conclave Supreme Ruler Wy. Bro. Wayne Barnes and his officers in place the conclave was opened. The Grand Director of Ceremonies, Christopher M. Davies, introduced the Grand Supreme Ruler to the Conclave.

Wayne welcomed Andrew Sweeney and of course offered him the gavel which on this occasion was accepted. Salutations followed to which Andrew responded with thanks and proceeded to commence the celebratory meeting. He remarked that it is impressive to see a Conclave remaining strong after 100 years and it was a very rare occasion indeed.

Andrew delivered a brief history of the conclave following which the Conclave Chaplain, V. Wy. Bro. John Beard, gave a wonderful oration.

Andrew invited the members of Supera Moras present to form up in the East and were personally congratulated and presented with a Centenary Jewel. An empty chair was in place in the East with a Grand Sash, Jewel and a roll of honour for the founders who are no longer present with the message 'lest we forget'.





Finally The Provincial Arch of Steel commanded by Wy. Bro. Shaun Higson were summoned to the East for inspection by Andrew and Chris Givvons . Before the Grand Supreme Ruler retired, Chris Givvons presented a cheque from the Province of East Lancashire for £1000, in favour of the O.S.M. benevolent fund to Andrew. He went on to thank Andrew for his support today and the terrific boost it had given to the order in East Lancashire.

With the Supreme Ruler Wayne Barnes restored to his rightful place he too had a presentation to make: £500 presented to the Arch of Steel from the Conclave which was received with thanks by Chris Givvons. Wayne thanked everyone for attending and supporting his Conclave for this very special meeting before closing and retiring.

The celebrations continued at a superb festive board where the brethren enjoyed a celebratory drink and a meal together. The Grand Supreme Ruler responded to a toast in his favour, thanking everyone for a warm welcome and a further reminder of what a special achievement today's meeting had been celebrating, he went on to propose a toast to the Conclave, following which Chris Givvons presented him with a nice bottle of champagne.



Supreme Ruler Wayne Barnes responded to that toast with warm thanks and appreciation of the support of all the Brethren.



Chris Givvons then presented the G.D.C. Chris Davies with a stone decanter containing sarsaparilla as a memento and thanks for his work at the meeting and festive board.

West Yorkshire O.S.M. Donation to the Multiple Sclerosis Therapy Centre (South Yorkshire) Ltd.



On Friday, 29 July the Provincial Grand Supreme Ruler of West Yorkshire, R.Wy.Bro. David Staniforth was joined by Darren Coleman-Heald, Charities Manager at Mark Masons Hall, and the Past Provincial Grand Almoner Wy.Bro. Peter Firth at the South Yorkshire Multiple Sclerosis Therapy Centre, Catcliffe, Rotherham.

This is a small autonomous, self-help, self-funding charity founded in 1985. The primary aim of the centre is to provide Oxygen Therapy for people living with Multiple Sclerosis and other life debilitating conditions. They provide access to a range of beneficial, non-intrusive, drug free and complimentary therapies in order to support patients, their families, and carers.

The Centre currently provides help and support for over 200 individuals, and do not receive any Government or NHS funding. In order to maintain their services, they need to raise in excess of £110K each year.

As a result of an application from Wy. Bro. Peter Firth it was agreed to donate £1,000 from the West Yorkshire OSM Benevolent Fund for the purchase of equipment required for the provision of pressurised Oxygen Therapy (Masks and Silicon Breathing Lines). The application gained 'Match Funding' from the Grand Conclave OSM Fund of Benevolence and a cheque for £2,000 was presented to the Centre manager – Julia Conlan-Greaves.



Specialised Oxygen Therapy consists of breathing medical oxygen through individual face masks within a pressure-controlled Hyperbolic Chamber. This is the most effective way to improve oxygen absorption and is widely used to help improve symptoms in many neurological conditions, head and spinal cord injuries and assisting in the healing of wounds and repair of muscle and tissue damage following cancer treatments.

After the presentation Julia said, *“You have no idea how much this means to us at the centre – therapy is costly, and every penny will be used for the purchase of equipment so that we can provide support for more people who are vulnerable and really in need.”*

Following her treatment one of the centres users commented *“The treatment I get here is marvellous – it’s made a massive difference to my life - without this I am convinced I would still be in my wheelchair”*.

At the meeting of Mark Grand Lodge at Freemasons' Hall on Tuesday, the Pro Grand Master, M.W.Br. Raymond John Smith, announced that the Mark Benevolent Fund would be donating £25,000 to the Mark Inspectorate of Romania who have been working proactively in many ways to provide support and relief to their neighbours in Ukraine.

This tremendous endeavour has touched Freemasons across the Constitution and many of our Brethren are keen to add their own support by making a donation.

We have set up a Relief Chest with the M.C.F. under the name of the **Mark Emergency Relief Fund** and you can now make donations in a variety of ways.

We know that there is enormous support for this already. To make the administration of donations as smooth as possible, enabling funds to be transferred efficiently to where they are needed most, we ask that you note the following advice regarding donations:

For individual donations of less than £100 - please make arrangements with your Mark Lodge for these to be collected centrally and then for the Lodge to make one consolidated donation into the

Fund. These consolidated donations will count toward the Lodge's M.B.F. honorifics, rather than each individuals.

Donations of £100 or more may be made by individuals directly into the fund and will count towards the Brother's M.B.F. Honorifics

V.W.Bro. Cristian Mihutoiu, Grand Inspector for Romania has sent us details of the humanitarian activities he and his Brethren are developing for the Ukrainian refugees.

1) ACCOMMODATION

For both refugees coming from the North by car and on foot, and those coming from the South by ferry, there are requirements for short term accommodation places for at least 3-4 days, after which some of them are travelling to other European countries while others are being hosted by Romanian families. For this purpose we are cooperating with the Government to supply the following facilities:

- special tents for more than 20 people
- electrical heating devices
- beds and blankets
- personal hygiene products

On the other hand, there are many small hotel owners which offer their facilities for the refugees asking in return for the payment for the utilities (gas, water, electricity).

2) MEDICAL SUPPLIES

- emergency kits
- small surgery kits
- antibiotics and other different medicines
- disinfecting solvents
- cleaning sets
- medical face masks

3) FOOD AND WATER SUPPLIES

- sandwiches
- warm food freshly prepared
- still water
- disposable plates and cups

4) TRANSPORTATION FROM THE BORDER TO DIFFERENT CITIES AND AIRPORT

Many Ukrainian refugees are leaving Romania after 3-4 days spent at the border, through the major airports, especially Bucharest. So they need free transportation.

5) SPECIAL PSYCHOLOGICAL CARE FOR CHILDREN AND MOTHERS

Small children and mothers are very shocked and need specialised psychological assistance to recover.

6) CLOTHES SUPPLIES

Collecting and storing clothes for adults and children and distributing to the refugees as well as specialised articles for children.

Additionally we face the problem with those refugees who are asking to stay in Romania and need integration, long term accommodation and integration in our society. Many of them speak only Ukrainian or Russian.

Please also note that in the first wave of refugees arriving in the past 10 days, most of them have some financial resources. But the second wave, starting next week, will be those with very poor resources and who will require better care and support.

As of Wednesday, more than 250,000 refugees crossed the Romanian border and we are expecting up to 1 million in the next 30 days or less.

We are developing different support programs including in cooperation with other important organisations such as our National Craft Grand Lodge and international charity organisations such as LIONS Romania.

This is a brief presentation of our activities in support of the Ukrainian refugees who are facing a dramatic situation at the Romanian borders.

We are living in difficult times which require us, more than ever, and out of compassion and unity, to help those in difficult situations. Brotherhood and friendship must prevail.

Helping to Combat Covid



At the start of Lockdown the Grand Secretary, R.W.Bro. Ryan A. Williams, P.G.J.W., shared the [COVID Symptom Study](#) app.
